
a note from pastor sen

2025 Month Two!

I still hold that the shortest month of the year feels like the longest because of the weather. February brings Black History Month, the Super Bowl, Valentine's Day, President's Day and my favorite Groundhog's day.

Last month, I said I'd like to look at the bests and the worsts of the church universal. Since it's Black History month, I thought I'd start there. It isn't hard to see where Christians got things very very wrong during the time of slavery in the United States. Even those Christians who did not participate in chattel slavery were far often too silent. The false notion that any race, nationality, or ethnicity was inferior to another led many down a broken path. We see this in the treatment of Native Americans and the people of African descent in our early American history. Through the work of those convinced of this falsehood, things were slowly changed. In 2019, the ELCA wrote a statement of apology for the injustices. But why? It's old history now right?

It is history, but it's part of our whole history. In the church year, we go through the same things over and over. Every year, we look at both the really hard stuff and the really joyful stuff. It helps us keep things in perspective. Easter Sunday is a joyous time, but it means even more if we've kept Lent, and remembered the history and pain of Good Friday. So, we learn that it's by acknowledging the brokenness, pain, and sin, that we are enabled to move on and bring about wholeness, connection, and joy. Acknowledging the long history of injustice and inequality (which wasn't over even after the 13th Amendment) is what is able to keep us moving forward toward the Reign of Christ when all injustices of any kind cease.



So, I share one more bit of history that moved the Lutheran church forward. In August of 1979, the Reverend Earlean Miller was ordained as the first Black woman pastor in the LCA (one of the predecessor bodies of the ELCA) Pastor Miller served in various places until she retired from Hope Lutheran Church, Columbus Ohio in 2000. Her ministry, and that of so many others, is part of the blessing we receive when we remember our history.

TRINITY CONGREGATION COUNCIL Meeting Highlights - January 23rd, 2025 - 7:00 pm

Attending: Pat Wiedenheft, P. Jen, Carrie Wiedenheft, Bill Bertsch, Betsy Stierhoff, Nancy Vollmer, Jim Bertsch, Barb Sessler, and Stephanie Lehr. Absent: Gayle Thompson, Sally Warner

Meeting called to order by President – Carrie Wiedenheft

Opening devotions were given by Pastor Jen

Minutes of previous meeting (December 2024) were reviewed. Correction to Worship/Music: Lenten Sundays will have 11am service. Bill made a motion to approve, Pat 2nd.

Treasurer's report for December was reviewed. No changes noted, but the janitor wage was overpaid; \$600 will be deducted at the end of January. The February audit date was discussed. Jim discussed the possibility of the youth group amount \$708.10 being put into a money market. Nancy motioned, Betsy 2nd.

President's Report: Carrie requested self-evaluations. Lutheran World Relief for the California wildfires will be distributed via bulletin and newsletter.

Pastor's Report: P. Jen is getting caught up on visits due to personal illness; she is calling as needed. She noted the transition of the office to the new secretary. The Lent Sunday youth skits were discussed; participation will be confirmation and high school demographic. A youth room mural was proposed, with the theme GLOW!. The Hispanic church has not followed up regarding hall rental.

Congregational Life – Carrie reported for Sally. The secretary farewell/welcome reception meal totaled \$875. 65 individuals signed up; 67 participated. A Team Spirit event for the Super Bowl was discussed; members may wear any team shirt and Trinity will be distributing "Team Jesus" pins. In March, there will be a PB&J event with a guest speaker from 1-2:30pm. White elephant prizes will awarded. Christmas cards are currently being accepted for crafting. Per Sally, the information will be published in bulletin.

Faith Builders – Pat Wiedenheft – Souper Bowl submarine event was discussed, along with clarification of cookie size. The amount of cereal boxes for the New Year event totaled 170.

Community Mission –Betsy Stierhoff – In the progress of establishing a meeting date. A family movie night was discussed.

Property –Bill noted the edited contract for Columbia Gas. The fellowship hall (in corners, etc) received a paint touch-up; floor under trophy case fixed; downstairs toilet fixed; Janotta & Herner evaluated the locks. P. Jen noted the outside hose modified by an anonymous individual.

Stewardship and Finance – Jim Bertsch – The annual audit was discussed. Stephanie was informed that she may contact Carol if questions shall arise.


